CREATING FUTURES 2015 (CF 15)

This is the sixth conference in a series in which the populations of interest are Indigenous peoples from Australia, New Zealand and beyond, the residents of Australia's neighbouring island nations, and people living with and recovering from mental and/or physical illness or disability in remote and tropical areas.

As with previous Creating Futures conferences there will be a focus on evidence and innovation in identifying and addressing the social determinants of mental and physical health and wellbeing. Special areas of interest will include:

- Creativity:
- Addressing social and behavioural determinants of chronic disease;
- Impediments to progress in chronic disease management: policy and practice in substance misuse;
- Person-valuing and community-building approaches to supporting and empowering people with disability and their carers;
- Detained populations (forensic and other);
- West Papua forgotten refugeesand more.

Building on the success and goodwill generated through the previous six conferences, the first day will be held at the Yarrabah Aboriginal community located 60 km from Cairns and will be hosted by <u>Gurriny Yealamucka</u>, the local Aboriginal health service. The following three days will be in central Cairns at the <u>Shangri-La Hotel</u>. Each morning and afternoon will commence with internationally and nationally recognised plenary speakers with concurrent presentations and workshops following.

Leadership in Mental Health: Island Nations Course

CF15 is pleased to announce that the Leadership in Mental Health: Island Nations course, auspiced by <u>Sangath</u> and the <u>London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine</u>, will be held for the first time in Australia coordinated with the conference. Since 2008 this course has inspired workers in the field from low and middle income countries around the world. In 2015 the course will address the particular issues of the island nations of the southern Pacific.

The Leadership in Mental Health course has been designed to meet two key objectives:

- 1. To equip participants with the methods to develop and scale up interventions for people with mental disorders in low resource settings; and
- 2. To enhance leadership skills needed to scale up health care programs and promote the human rights of people affected by mental disorders.

This course builds capacity to meet the goals for the Movement for Global Mental Health and the Lancet series on Global Mental Health 2007. The course will be locally auspiced by James Cook University (The Cairns Institute and the Australian Institute for Tropical Health and Medicine) in conjunction with the Queensland Institute for Medical Research Berghofer Institute and the University of Queensland (School of Population Health). It will replicate the structure of the Goa course whose founders, Vikram Patel and Graham Thornicroft will present. Participants will be provided with prereading and the six days of the course will be a mix of didactic presentations and task-focused group work.

Delegates from Pacific Island nations will be prioritised in registration and course costs will be on a sliding scale (high income vs. low and middle income countries) and there will be a further discount for those delegates who also attend the conference.
